A word from Bishop Rose

I am delighted that in our diocese we continue to celebrate the generosity of God's love through the wonderful testimonies of lives being changed. I am grateful for all that our churches are able to achieve in their communities.

In 2023 we witnessed the abundance of gifts of ministry and mission at work in local churches, shared in our parishes and deaneries. I am privileged to see this in action, travelling across our diocese meeting with school communities, youth groups, Bible study groups... the list is endless.

I again led numerous Confirmation services, including one at the Cathedral in November where over 50 candidates were confirmed!

Further afield, in August I visited Madagascar, our link diocese, renewing our commitment to mutual prayer and support, bringing blessings and prayers of the Madagascan people back to Canterbury.

Seeing all these signs of God's goodness around our diocese and beyond demonstrates that we need to remain thankful for God's generosity to us all. This generosity is something that we as a church and as disciples are called to give back to God in return, as we serve our communities and pattern the example of Christ.

2023 involved renewing our commitment to social justice. We now have the Social Justice Network to better position ourselves to access funding for its work. Financial review of 2023



The year 2023 can be characterised as one of steep increases in the cost of living and interest rates, coupled with a rise in geo-political tensions globally. These inflationary pressures on costs, especially clergy stipends and other salaries (approximately 76% of total costs), meant that Parish Share requests (including grants, approximately 75% of total revenue), had to be

increased just at a time when parishes, too, were facing considerable increases in their local costs. Despite continued, valiant efforts to grapple with these challenges, for which we are extremely grateful, the amount of Parish Share actually received as a percentage of the total requested in 2023 was lower than the previous year. This was the primary reason for an unrestricted operational loss recorded of £442k (consolidated loss of £618k).

Whilst we still maintain relatively large reserves and are sufficiently solvent to cover this shortfall, we are acutely aware of the urgent need to balance our future finances sustainably. A detailed financial review has concluded that by far the best way forward is to grow. We were delighted that our 2024 application for funding of church planting projects amounting to £3.25m was awarded by the national church; this in addition to a £1m grant in 2023. These funds dovetail perfectly with our diocese's Three Bold Outcomes for 2030.

As it will realistically be some more time before the benefits of these initiatives and investments come to fruition, and given the ongoing challenges provided by the external environment, we are anticipating a continued shortfall in Parish Share received in 2024, which we are planning to fund by further realisation of non-strategic property assets and use of our reserves.

Thank you for your generosity, perseverance and commitment to our church and mission.


Finance 2023

OUR INCOME & EXPENDITURE

Parish Share is our main source of diocesan income. Additional income comes from property rentals and sales (which can vary significantly from year to year) as well as investments and parochial fees. Other income - such as capital grants for schools and grant funding from the Church Commissioners - can only be used for particular purposes (such as our work with Ignite communities and our strategy).


The majority of our total expenditure is on ministry costs - which includes everything from clergy housing, stipends and pensions to training and development for both lay and ordained ministers.

Total income £'000




Finance 2023
